“ Memories of an Eldest Brother – Part 1

Whether you knew our brother by his given name: Clarence August Bauer Jr., or by Buddy or Hank, or as a father or grandfather, as a Master Sargent, or as a friend or neighbor; he was someone I know you will miss and will feel as a loss today. But that loss will lessen with time because the feeling of loss brings with it the memories that are who he was to you. So, whenever you do think of him seek out those memories and they will help to heal the wound and fill the void he leaves.

Buddy had many dimensions and facets to his being, and each of us I am sure knew a lot of them in common. He was a gregarious sort that made him fit in and comfortable with others and able to be at ease around them and have them be at ease with him. This affability is one of the threads that pulls forth those memories which will lighten the heart and lift the spirit. Buddy would want you to remember those moments and occasions that you enjoyed together.

It's not hard to have experienced such things with him, he was always about and doing something. From his youth he was off with his friends staying out of or getting into trouble, or working with them at a garage fixing cars, rebuilding a small airplane engine in his own in the backyard, and eventually setting off on his own by enlisting in the air force. Even as his life followed a course familiar to us: marriage, raising a family, retiring from the military, finding a new career, and eventually retiring to a life of still staying busy; Buddy was both working at life and enjoying it with others.

To help each of us deal with his passing, I know what Buddy would do in our situation. He would tell us to recall some of those unique and special moments that you had with or know about Buddy and tell you to share it with one another.

From the perspective of his youngest sibling, Buddy memories come more through the stories by and about him and things he did

then me being part of them myself; but there are still those personal moments which always come to mind when thinking about him.

I heard about our mother tying Buddy to one of the trees in our front yard when he was little, because he was always running off when told not to leave the yard. So, I have been told. Buddy had other ideas and would just go. So, our mother put a harness on him and tied a rope (aka, a leash) to he could not run off. Nonetheless, Buddy worked his way out of the harness and off he went. This was an early indication of Buddy's independent streak.

My youngest sister also learned stories about Buddy that she could never have experienced directly either. Janet recalled that she had been told that Buddy often came home with some injury that required our mother to attend to him, and after some numerous first-aid interventions Mom told him that the next time he got hurt to take care of it himself. So, when he had a nail go through his foot and he went alone to the local hospital and our mother got a call from the hospital about him coming to them to get his foot treated and why she didn't come with him, she was a bit annoyed. When he returned from the hospital their discussion concluded with Mom throwing a Pepsi bottle at him which he ducked so that it left an indentation in the wall So, we are told.

Now, I also do have my own stories with Buddy. I can think of our shared interest in science, like when he wanted to see how high a firecracker would lift a brick on top of a tin can. Though I suppose it may have only been educationally instructive to me. Then there is that small airplane engine he was restoring. I remember standing around watching him working on it. And at some point he asked me to hold the spark-plug wire which I was very eager to do. He then turn the crankshaft and I learned a shocking lesson. If you don't know how something works, lacking that understanding can literally shock you. Buddy also introduced me to my first beer during a visit home when I was around 10 to 12. This may be been much more to my benefit than I know, as beer was not the unknown mystery that it might have been as a teenager. Who wanted to drink something that put you to sleep!

Many of the most memorable of my memories are stories that Buddy told me when he returned on visits to my parents' house or my other brother's or my sisters' houses; or stories that were shared with me by my siblings. I learned more about Buddy through the substance of those stories than through my own direct experiences. I regret that I never got to experience one of Buddy's big barbecues, but just hearing about them was something that offered a future opportunity to look forward to. While it is now gone, the memory remains; and that is its own reward.

Buddy was able to succeed in life because he was knowledgeable and talented, and he was sought out to help solve problems in work and I am sure in life. His grandsons will no doubt benefit in their lives from being around him. Our brother was a good man who dearly loved his family and whom he was very proud of. So, while we are all sad today, let your memories help in the coming days to find solace in his passing and that tomorrow's thoughts will bring comfort and peace. I believe Buddy would say he lived a well-lived life.

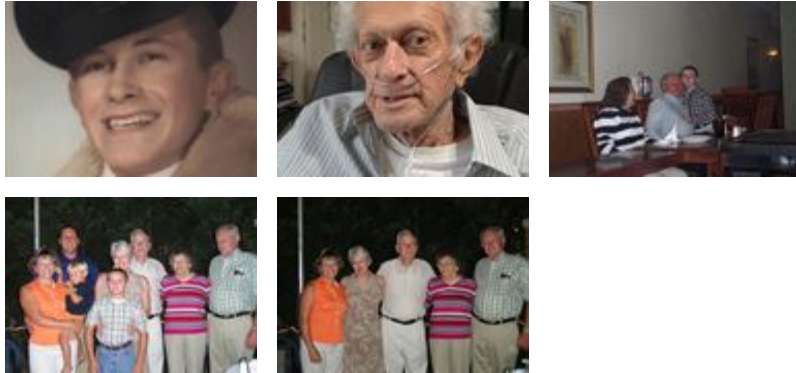
